APAS, with its partners Rotary Club and Socorro Animal Shelter and Adoption Center, is now in its third year producing the Pet of the Month ads for *El Defensor Chieftain*. Rotary Club is continuing to pay for the ads, and each month the shelter selects a resident dog they feel would be an ideal pet. Medium to large dogs are commonly featured in the ads because they often stay longer at the shelter. These dogs are spayed or neutered, and what they now need is a little publicity to highlight their many desirable qualities—their friendliness and playfulness. They just want to be a loving companion, to take long walks, and rides in the car. They want so much to be part of a family. All of us hope that these ads will encourage you to visit the shelter and meet these and the other

delightful animals temporarily living there. Look for Pet of the Month in the third week's *Chieftain*.

Since March 2022 thirteen Pet of the Month dogs (and one cat) have been adopted, and seven have been transported to rescue organizations, such as Best Friends Animal Sanctuary in Utah.



In Service to Dogs

With the passing of Ruth White last February, some of Socorro's neediest dogs lost a dedicated friend. When Ruth moved to New Mexico from Ohio, she brought with her a passion for animals and theater. She performed in several Socorro Community Theater productions. Ruth was also a member of APAS and served as its president in 2001. For more than 13 years she walked dogs every Friday at the city shelter. Those who volunteered with her remember that she consistently picked

APAS's Spay/Neuter Program 2019–2023

Lingering Effects of COVID

Much of APAS's long-time work has been offering low-fee spay and neuter surgeries for the cats and dogs of city and county residents with limited incomes. The table below shows the number of procedures APAS has helped pay, for each of the last 5 years. The table also shows that we rebounded from COVID-19 limitations to accessing spay/neuter services, and that in 2023 APAS surpassed previous years in total subsidized procedures. So far in 2024 we are on track to match or exceed the 2023 totals thanks to the generous donations from our members and friends and funding from other private and state resources.

Spaying and neutering dogs and cats is beneficial for their health, and it is important in controlling the pet population. Nonetheless, last year animal shelters and rescue organizations across the country reported record numbers of relinquished pets, in addition to the typical numbers of strays and litters in their care. APAS doesn't want pet surrender to be a pet owner's only choice. In addition to doubling the number of surgeries in the past 2 years, APAS's response has included increasing its subsidy for each surgical procedure to \$200.00 and expanding the spay/neuter program to Catron County.

Overcrowded shelters are not just related to the pandemic. In fact, adoptions and fostering increased as more people worked from home; however, adoptions and fostering then declined when workers returned to their offices. Pets are ending up in shelters also because of natural disasters and the shortage of affordable housing. Unemployment increased in 2020 at the beginning of the pandemic, and rent and mortgages went unpaid. When government restrictions on eviction were lifted, many families were forced to look for more affordable housing. Many rentals won't accept large dogs or certain breeds or require exorbitant pet fees or don't allow pets at all. In some regions veterinary services are in short supply, and the cost of pet care and medications has increased.

Pets are an important part of our lives, and adopting a shelter pet creates a special bond and a heightened sense of responsibility to that animal when times get tough. APAS will continue to use its resources to keep families together through the spay/neuter and emergency medical programs and through its distribution of supplementary pet food at the Socorro Storehouse.
